

Scrappie Suri Sack V. 4.0

Materials Needed:

16" size 8 circular needle

Cable needle

Stitch markers

Worsted weight 100% wool scraps (I prefer Cestari fine merino) *(I find textured areas show up better with lighter shades of yarn)*

Tapestry needle for weaving ends

Gauge: 4.5 – 5 stitches per inch and 7 rounds = 1"

Approximate size = 16" - 20" around & 20" long

Abbreviations Used:

K = knit

P = purl

SC = Switch Colors

* = anything between stars is continued around until the directions tell you to stop.

(PHOTO IS NOT EXACTLY THE SAME AS THIS PATTERN EXPLAINS)

This scrappie sack is great for snuggling a newborn up over their shoulders, but also perfect as they grow in length! Fits nicely under their arms for a great sleepy sack!

*****If you slip your pattern into a page protector, I have added little squares like this ☐ so that you can mark them off with a dry erase marker to keep track of your rounds. You can always just mark them with a pencil instead, but the page protector also keeps your pattern nice and clean and you can easily wipe off your marks and reuse it without erasing pencil marks!*****

Begin by casting on 80 stitches using the [long-tail cast on method](#) (my video tutorial). Join to begin knitting "in the round" (being careful not to twist stitches) and place a stitch marker to mark the start of the round. (This will be the left side of the sack)

You will be knitting stripes of different colors and every OTHER stripe will have texture.

Round 1: K2, P2 ten times (first 40 stitches), place a stitch marker, K40 (front will roll but back will lay flat!). Continue in this manner until piece measures 1 ¼ inches. Remove marker.

SC (use "[jogless jog](#)" to keep color changes straight!) and knit 4 rounds. ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐

Simple Seed Stitch Stripe:

1. **SC** and knit 2 rounds. ☐ ☐
2. * K3, P1 * around. ☐
3. K three rounds. ☐ ☐ ☐
4. K1, * P1, K3 * to last 3 stitches, P1, K2. ☐
5. K one round. ☐

SC and K five rounds. ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐

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Tracks Pattern Stripe

1. **SC** and K three rounds. ☐ ☐ ☐

2. * K4, P6 * around. ☐

3. K three rounds. ☐ ☐ ☐

4. * P5, K4, P1 * around. ☐

5. K two rounds. ☐ ☐

SC and K six rounds. ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐

Diamond Seed Pattern Stripe

1. **SC** and K two rounds. ☐ ☐

2. * P1, K7 * around. ☐

3. * K1, P1, K5, P1* around. ☐

4. * K2, P1, K3, P1, K1* around. ☐

5. * K3, P1, K1, P1, K2* around. ☐

6. * K4, P1, K3 around. ☐

Repeat round 5. ☐

Repeat round 4. ☐

Repeat round 3. ☐

Repeat round 2. ☐

K one round. ☐

SC and K seven rounds. ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐

Knit and Purl Striping

1. **SC** and K two rounds. ☐ ☐

2. P one round. ☐

3. K one round. ☐

Repeat rounds 2 and 3 three times each. P ☐ K ☐ P ☐ K ☐ P ☐ K ☐

SC and knit five rounds. ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐

Seed Stitch Pattern Stripe

1. **SC** and knit 1 round. ☐

2. * K1, P1* around. ☐

3. * P1, K1* around. ☐

Repeat rounds 2 and 3 four times. 2 ☐ 3 ☐ 2 ☐ 3 ☐ 2 ☐ 3 ☐ 2 ☐ 3 ☐

SC and K seven rounds. ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐

SC and Repeat DIAMOND SEED PATTERN rounds.

SC and K five rounds. ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐

SC and Repeat SIMPLE SEED PATTERN rounds.

SC and K five rounds. ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐

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Cable Pattern Stripe (this will cinch the bottom in a bit, which is nice)

1. **SC** and K two rounds. ☐ ☐

2. P2, * K6, P4* seven times until 8 stitches remain, K6, P2. ☐

3. Repeat round 2 two times. ☐ ☐

4. P2, * slip next 3 stitches to a cable needle (holding them to the back of work), K3, K the 3 stitches off the cable needle, P4* around until 8 stitches remain, slip 3 to cable needle (hold to the back), K3, K the 3 stitches off from cable needle, P2. ☐

5. Repeat round 2 three times. ☐ ☐ ☐

6. K one round. ☐

2 X 2 Ribbing (This is the final stripe!)

1. **SC** and K one round. ☐

2. * K2, P2* around. ☐

Repeat round 2 seven times. ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐ ☐

Bind Off all stitches loosely! (I do this by knitting two stitches together through the back loops and putting the stitch from the right needle onto the left. Repeat this all the way around until you have bound off all of the stitches!)

Turn work inside out and carefully weave in all ends behind work!

If you would like to be able to cinch the bottom in, you can [knit an i-cord](#) (click link to view my video tutorial) and weave it between the “purl” rows of the ribbing and use it as a drawstring! This is nice for when babies are small and then as they grow taller, you can remove it and let their little toes peek out! * **Remember that an i-cord could be a potential hazard if it isn't double tied! If pulled out, a child could choke or get strangled, so BE CAUTIOUS!***

Turn it back to the right side and admire your beautiful Scrappie Suri Sack!!
