## Rough Diamonds

## A Rectangular Shawl



Crochet Pattern by Jo Creates
I've been inspired by the Scheepjes Whirl range of yarn, the way the colour fades is fantastic and I love working with it. I made a triangle shawl, but its not really "me", I much prefer a rectangular wrap / pashmina as I find them more practical. I wanted something that had a simple pattern so that the main effect was from the Scheepjes Whirl.

Why not a set of diamonds? - every girl loves a diamond right?

## Introduction

Suggested Yarn: This pattern has been designed for use with one ball of Scheepjes Whirl. It's a 4ply fingering weight yarn so substituting with any similar yarn should work!

Each Whirl is between 215-225g and measures 1000 m in length)
Hook: 2 mm (or whatever hook required to get to gauge)
Finished Size: 158 cm wide by 46 cm deep
Gauge: 21.5 stitches per 10 cm and 12 rows per 10 cm (pre-blocking) using treble crochet stitches.
If you are using Scheepjes Whirl, gauge is fairly important, it is designed to use one ball and to get the full effect of the colour transition, it uses pretty much the whole ball (you might have a little bit left over).

I've given tips for weighing half-way through to make sure you are on gauge. If you are slightly out then you can skip the penultimate row without affecting the pattern in an obvious way.

If you are using any other yarn, gauge isn't too important!
Suitable for: Anyone with experience of making chain and treble crochet stitches. I've tried my best to explain the stages as simply as possible!

## Notes:

This is a filet crochet pattern, where the design is made up by making chain-space stitches. Because of this, the easiest way to demonstrate this pattern is using a chart.
I know not everyone likes reading charts (trust me, this one is super simple though!!) and so I've also included written instructions at the end
For simplicity, I've coloured the "holes" in grey on the chart. Each "hole" is made by chaining 2 and skipping the two stitches beneath it. Whenever you see a chain 2 , skip the two stitches beneath. The pattern instructions will hopefully describe this further if that isn't clear.

The chart is split up over 8 pages, Page 1 of the pattern starts on page 3 of this pattern and is put back together as follows. This should also give you an idea of the overall design!

For this chart, start at the top and work down, working left to right and then right to left

## Part 1-Top Border Rows

As I mentioned in the notes at the top, l've converted the charts above into a written pattern too.
In an attempt to make it easier to follow, l've split the written pattern into 4 sections, top border, diamond row 1, diamond row 2 and bottom border. You can follow either the chart or the written pattern or hop between the two.

This first section of the written pattern creates the diamond border around the top edge of the pattern (as shown below)


You will need to do this Top Border Row section only once.
Instructions are as follows:

| Chain | Chain 311 stitches |
| :--- | :--- |
| Row $\mathbf{1}$ | In the 3rd chain from the hook, 1tr, then make 1tr in each ch to the end of the row [308 stitches] |
| Row 2 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, then *ch2, sk2, 2tr, repeat from * until last 5 stitches, 5tr |
| Row 3 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, then *ch2, sk2, 2tr, repeat from * until last 5 stitches, 3tr |
| Row $\mathbf{4}$ | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, then ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, *[ch2, sk2, 2tr] 3 times, [ch2, sk2, 6tr] 1 time, repeat from * until there are 11 stitches <br> left, then, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| Row 5 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 10tr then *[ch2, sk2, 2tr] 2 times, [ch2, sk2, 10tr] 1 time, repeat from * until there are 9 stitches <br> left then, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 3tr |
| Row 6 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, then *ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, repeat from * until there are 7 stitches left then ch2, sk2, 5tr |

This is the first of two main pattern repeats, creating the first row of diamonds, as shown below


Instructions are as follows:

| Row $\mathbf{7}$ | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, then *ch2, sk2, 18tr, repeat from * until there are 5 stitches left then ch2, sk2, 3tr |
| :--- | :--- |
| Row 8 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, then *ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, repeat from * until there are 7 stitches left, ch2, sk2, 5tr |$|$| Row 9 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 10tr, then *ch2, sk2, 6tr, ch2, sk2, 10tr, repeat from * until there are 9 stitches left, ch2, sk2, 2tr, <br> ch2, sk2, 3tr |
| :--- | :--- |
| Row 10 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, then *ch2, sk2, 10tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr repeat from * until <br> there are 11 stitches left, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| Row 11 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, [ch2, sk2, 2tr] 3 times then * ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, repeat from <br> * until there are 13 stitches left, then ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 3tr |
| Row 12 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, then * ch2, sk2, 8tr, ch2, sk2, 8tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, repeat from * until <br> there are 15 stitches remaining then ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| Row 13 | Repeat Row 11 |
| Row 14 | Repeat Row 10 |
| Row 15 | Repeat Row 9 |
| Row 16 | Repeat Row 8 |
| Row 17 | Repeat Row 7 |

## Part 3-Main Pattern Repeat 2

This is the second of two main pattern repeats, creating the second row of diamonds, as shown below


Instructions are as follows:

| Row $\mathbf{1 8}$ | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, then *ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, repeat from * until there are 7 stitches left, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| :--- | :--- |
| Row $\mathbf{1 9}$ | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 10tr, then *ch2, sk2, 6tr, ch2, sk2, 10tr, repeat from * until there are 9 stitches left, ch2, sk2, <br> 2tr, ch2, sk2, 3tr |
| Row 20 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, then *ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, ch2, sk2, 10tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, repeat from * <br> until there are 11 stitches remaining then ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| Row 21 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, [ch2, sk2, 2tr] three times, then * ch2, sk2, 14tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, <br> repeat from * until there are 13 stitches remaining then ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 3tr |
| Row 22 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, then *ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 8tr, ch2, sk2, 8tr, repeat from * <br> until there are 15 stitches left then, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| Row 23 | Repeat Row 21 |
| Row 24 | Repeat Row 20 |
| Row 25 | Repeat Row 19 |
| Row 26 | Repeat Row 18 |
| Row 27 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, then *ch2, sk2, 18tr, repeat from * until there are 5 stitches left then ch2, sk2, 3tr |

This is the second repeat of the first main pattern repeats, creating the third row of diamonds, as shown below


Tip: If you are using Scheepjes Whirl, weigh your work and your yarn at this point, you are half-way through and so the ball and the work should weigh about the same. If the ball weighs slightly more or slightly less than the work, you can adjust by adjusting your gauge slightly. If you are also can also leave the penultimate row out without ruining the pattern. If you are miles out though you should go back and check your gauge with a smaller hook

Instructions are as follows:

| Row $\mathbf{2 8}$ | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, then *ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, repeat from * until there are 7 stitches left, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| :--- | :--- |$|$| Row $\mathbf{2 9}$ | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 10tr, then *ch2, sk2, 6tr, ch2, sk2, 10tr, repeat from * until there are 9 stitches left, ch2, sk2, 2tr, <br> ch2, sk2, 3tr |
| :--- | :--- |
| Row 30 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, then *ch2, sk2, 10tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr repeat from * until <br> there are 11 stitches left, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| Row 31 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, [ch2, sk2, 2tr] 3 times then * ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, repeat from <br> * until there are 13 stitches left, then ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 3tr |
| Row 32 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, then * ch2, sk2, 8tr, ch2, sk2, 8tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, repeat from * until <br> there are 15 stitches remaining then ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| Row 33 | Repeat Row 31 |
| Row 34 | Repeat Row 30 |
| Row 35 | Repeat Row 29 |
| Row 36 | Repeat Row 28 |
| Row 37 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, then *ch2, sk2, 18tr, repeat from * until there are 5 stitches left then ch2, sk2, 3tr |

## Part 5-Main Pattern Repeat 2

This is the second repeat of the second main pattern repeats, creating the fourth row of diamonds, as shown below


Instructions are as follows:

| Row $\mathbf{3 8}$ | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, then *ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, repeat from * until there are 7 stitches left, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| :--- | :--- |
| Row 39 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 10tr, then *ch2, sk2, 6tr, ch2, sk2, 10tr, repeat from * until there are 9 stitches left, ch2, sk2, <br> 2tr, ch2, sk2, 3tr |
| Row 40 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, then *ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, ch2, sk2, 10tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, repeat from * <br> until there are 11 stitches remaining then ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| Row 41 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, [ch2, sk2, 2tr] three times, then * ch2, sk2, 14tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, <br> repeat from * until there are 13 stitches remaining then ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 3tr |
| Row 42 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, then *ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, ch2, sk2, 4tr, ch2, sk2, 8tr, ch2, sk2, 8tr, repeat from * <br> until there are 15 stitches left then, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| Row 43 | Repeat Row 41 |
| Row 44 | Repeat Row 40 |
| Row 45 | Repeat Row 39 |
| Row 46 | Repeat Row 38 |
| Row 47 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, then *ch2, sk2, 18tr, repeat from * until there are 5 stitches left then ch2, sk2, 3tr |

## Part 6-Bottom Border Rows

This final section of the pattern creates the diamond border around the bottom edge of the pattern (as shown below)
You will need to do this Bottom Border Row section only once.


Instructions are as follows:

| Row $\mathbf{4 8}$ | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, then *ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 14tr, repeat from * until there are 7 stitches left then ch2, sk2, 5 tr |
| :--- | :--- |
| Row $\mathbf{4 9}$ | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 10tr then *[ch2, sk2, 2tr] 2 times, [ch2, sk2, 10tr] 1 time, repeat from * until there are 9 stitches left <br> then, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 3tr |
| Row 50 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, then ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 6tr, *[ch2, sk2, 2tr] 3 times, [ch2, sk2, 6tr] 1 time, repeat from * until there are 11 stitches left, <br> then, ch2, sk2, 2tr, ch2, sk2, 5tr |
| Row 51 | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 2tr, then *ch2, sk2, 2tr, repeat from * until last 5 stitches, 5tr |
| Row 52* | Ch3 (counts as stitch), 4tr, then *ch2, sk2, 2tr, repeat from * until last 5 stitches, 5tr |
| Row 53 | Make 1tr in each ch to the end of the row [308 stitches] |

*Note, if you have got to this point and have nearly run out of yarn, you can miss this row 52 without ruining the pattern too much! You can't miss the last row though! Hopefully you won't have done though!
