



As soon as I saw the Honeycomb Brioche Stitch, I immediately wanted to design with it. The stitch pattern seemed like the perfect tactile experience for the neck. The symmetrical design and straight lines give it a very academic feel, making it the perfect scarf to make with school colors.

Difficulty Level - Intermediate

Materials Needed

Yarn: Brown Sheep Lamb's Pride Worsted (80% Wool, 20% Mohair) MC - 1 skein; Onyx CC - 1 skein Amethyst Needles: Straight or Circular US10/ 6mm needles Notions: Bobbin Tapestry Needle

Size: - (after blocking) 56 inches/142.5 cm x 7 inches/18cm



Pattern:

Start by balling up about 10 yards of the MC onto a bobbin.

Cast on 28 sts using MC (very loosely, it will need to stretch)

Preparation Rows Row 1 - (WS) K1, P1, K1 *K1, yo, sl1; rep from* end K1, P1, K1. Row 2 - (RS) K1, P1, K2 *sl the yo st, K2; rep from*, sl yo st, K2, P1, K1. Pattern Stitch Row 3 - K1, P1, K1, *Yo, sl1 K2tog (the yo st and the next st); rep from* K1, P1, K1. Row 4 - K1, P1, K1, *K2, sl the yo st; rep from* K1, P1, K1. Row 5 - K1, P1, K1, *(Change to CC) K2tog (the yo st and next st), yo, sl1; rep from * (attach bobbin of MC) K1, P1, K1. Row 6 - K1, P1, K1, (Change to CC) K1, *sl the yo st, k2; rep from* sl yo st k1, (change to MC) K1, P1, K1.

Repeat Rows 3-6 until out of yarn

To finish do the last two rows (5 and 6) in the MC.

Bind off and weave in ends.

Blocking:

Get 2 pieces of scrap yarn 2 yards each, and 2 pieces 1 yard each. Weave the longer pieces in the long length of the scarf along each edge. Weave the shorter ones along the short edges of the scarf. Soak in luke warm water for 20 mins. Put in the washer spin cycle to wring out excess water. Stretch the scarf out on a towel. Pull scrap yarns taught and pin down to sufficiently stretch scarf to slightly longer than desired length and width. Let dry. Enjoy!
