

Skill Level

Experienced beginner. The stitches are easy, but knitting with that many yarns, dropping them and finishing could be tricky for a new beginner.

Skills Needed

Cast on, knit, bind off and dropping stitches.

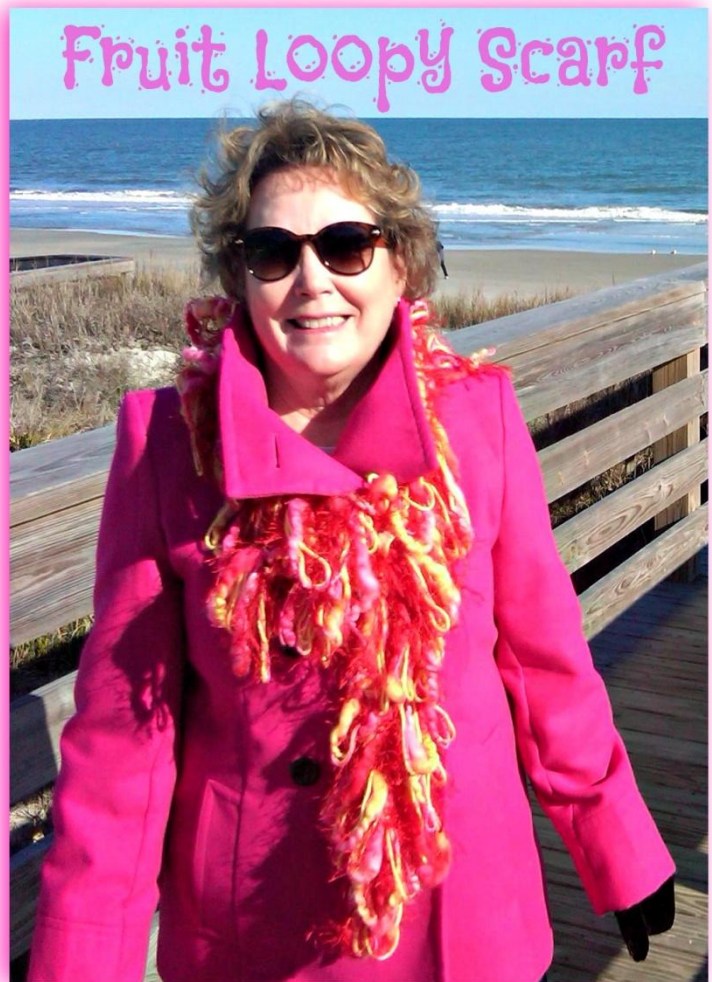
Materials

Needle: US 13, 9 mm

Gauge: Gauge isn't important for this project.

Yarn

- For the sample, I used:
- Loops & Threads Jubilee, Bulky, 1 skein (100 g./54 yards)
- Caron Simply Soft, Worsted, about ¼ skein (55 yards)
- Fun Fur, Novelty, a little more than ¾ skein
- Paton's Grace, Sport, about ½ skein



This easy scarf can be made with any combination of yarn you have available, all held together. I recommend using at least three or different types, using different weights and textures to add interest.

The pattern as written, makes a full chunky scarf with a barely noticeable center. Adjustments for other yarns and preferences can easily be made by having a wider middle (i.e. binding off fewer stitches), using fewer yarns or smaller needles. Play around with the combinations to find your favorite.

Pattern (as shown above)

Holding all four yarns together, CO 10

Knit garter until desired length

Knit 4

BO 2 (this will be your center base or column)

Drop 4 stitches on right needle (these will be the loops on one side) and carefully unravel one row at a time to the end. After pulling each loop out of the four stitches, tie it in a knot at the base (against the two bound off stitches)

Drop 4 stitches on left needle (this will be the loops on the other side) and do the same

Drape yourself in loopiness and enjoy!

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That's it. There's really not much to it. There aren't even ends to weave in!

This is really more of recipe than a pattern. I kept seeing these fun scarves all over the various festivals and craft fairs and knew I could make one with a little direction and the right yarn. I did buy a pattern that looked similar to this but was a lot more complicated than it needed to be, in my opinion. Then I found a few links to projects on Ravelry and across the web with this technique for free. I combined what I found into this pattern.

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
