

Shown here in Dream in Color Classy, In Vino Veritas, ~122 grams.

#### **Pattern**

Cast on 32 stitches.

## Starting edge

Rows 1-9: Work in garter stitch (knit every row).

Row 10 (WS): K4, purl to last 4 stitches, K4.

# Scarfy goodness

Row 1 (RS): K4, (K5, P1) repeat to last 4 stitches, K4.

Even rows 2-12: K4, work even (knit the knits, purl the purls) to last 4 stitches, K4.

Row 3: K4, (K4, P1, K1) repeat to last 4 stitches, K4.

Row 5: K4, (K3, P1, K2) repeat to last 4 stitches, K4.

Row 7: K4, (K2, P1, K3) repeat to last 4 stitches, K4.

Row 9: K4, (K1, P1, K4) repeat to last 4 stitches, K4.

Row 11: K4, (P1, K5) repeat to last 4 stitches, K4.

Repeat these 12 rows to desired length, ending with a Row 12.

## Ending edge

Rows 1-9: Work in garter stitch (knit every row). Bind off.

## Finishing

Weave in all ends. Wash, block, wear, turn up The Knack and belt out "My ScWiNoNa" until the people in the white jackets come and take you away!

# **ScWiNoNa**

I needed a last-minute scarf for my sister-in-law, whose fruh-fruh meter ticks in at the low end. But the thought of knitting one long stockinette rectangle was enough to send me running for the hills, so I dug through my knitting library and came up with this – the Scarf With No Name!

It's simple enough to knit up quickly (this one took about two nights), but interesting enough to keep you out of stockinette hell. And the result? A very striking scarf that works great for women, men, kids, pets, you name it! Looks pretty cool on the flip side, too!

**Gauge:** 5 stitches/7 rows per inch in stockinette **Yarn:** ~122 grams of worsted weight (~265 yards)
(Actual yardage will vary depending on desired length –
this amount yielded a 70" long scarf after blocking) **Needles:** Size 7 or whatever floats your gauge boat **Size:** Around 6.25" wide x desired length

# Tips:

- The scarf will curl like a mofo while you're knitting, even with the substantial garter edging. Do not fear, as this should straighten out quite easily with blocking.
- This is very easy mod up/down simply add/reduce the number of stitches by multiples of 6 (the stitch pattern in the parentheses).
